

### Global Studies: Italy and Reggio Emilia



All over Italy, including Reggio Emilia, many chapels and buildings are elaborately decorated by famous artists of the day. The Basilica di San Prospero is no exception. The Prairie class got the chance to see how Michelangelo felt when he was commissioned by the Pope in 1508 to paint the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel. He worked for four years, painting upside down on a scaffold to finish the painting. Paper was placed on the underside of a table and the children lay on their backs and drew pictures under

the table. They were asked if they thought it was easy or hard to paint lying down.







During the week of September 16, the Prairie students took a virtual tour of Italy through the web site www.airpano.com. After looking at the geography of Italy, the children were given a picture of Italy copied on cardstock, they then filled in the shape of the country with different types of pasta. Pasta is part of almost every meal in Italy.







# Math:

During the month of September, the Prairie students will be taking a closer look at the colors and shapes in their environment. During the first week each child was given a color wheel. Next, they gathered up natural items in various colors and taped the flowers, leaves and other natural items to the corresponding color on the wheel.







During the week of September 16, the Prairie students completed a shape hunt. Each child chose a felt piece shape and then went on a hunt to find the same shape in their environment. Once the shape was discovered, the children took a picture of the object that represented the shape of choice.














## **Literacy:**








During the week of September 16th each student had the opportunity to tell their own story by drawing a picture and providing us details about it. This way we were able to create a collaborative class book of different stories from all our friends. Some of the students made up their own stories with favorite characters from different books or new characters. Others decided to draw a picture of their favorite story they have heard from home.





## **Science:**



This week in science we put the focus on bugs and our natural environment. The Prairie classroom has been so intrigued by the bugs we find outdoors. This sparked our interest to do a science experiment with roly poly bugs in a built maze using magnatiles. First, we gathered up roly poly bugs that we found outside by moving logs and searching under wood chips. Each student had their own roly poly and gave their prediction on whether they thought their bug would go to the apple end or the tomato end. 15 students thought it would go to the apples and 8 thought it would go to the tomato. The bugs did go to both ends to eat, but more went to the apples. The students loved watching their bugs run to each side of

the maze. In the end, we concluded that maybe they went to the apples because we love eating apples so much in the Prairie classroom. Encouraging a love of the outdoors and exploration with bugs and experimentation was a great way to introduce science this school year!










During the week of September 16th we talked about the importance of fossils in the discovery of dinosaurs. We then incorporated our interest of bugs and created bug fossils using clay. The students had a great time exploring how the clay moves and feels and how the different bugs looked when we made imprints with them. We also talked about the different names for each of the bugs expanding our intelligence and awareness of the bugs around us outside.









# Yoga:



Throughout the month of September, the Prairie students will be practicing different calming yoga breaths and guided meditation. During peace week the students first laid down and closed their eyes as they listened to a guided meditation to feel the Earth and listen to the sounds around them in order to be calm and feel peace in their bodies. Next, the children were given feathers to practice some calming breaths. They held the feather in the palm of their hand and blew it gently away from them. We finished our yoga session with a hot air balloon breath and blowing out our five

candles.





## <u>International Dot Day:</u>

On September 13, the Prairie students celebrated International Dot Day. *The Dot*, written by Peter H. Reynolds is a story about a girl; Vasti who believes she is not an artist, until her teacher asked her to make a mark and sign it. Soon Vasti is challenging herself to create different ways to make dots! Coming to the realization that every child is an artist. To celebrate, the Prairie students made

their own mark by drawing circles in the sand, designing watercolor dots and using their fingerprints on a collaborative art piece.







# **Literacy:**

The Prairie students worked on letter recognition and formation as they used natural materials to form the letters of the alphabet. After their letter was complete they took pictures of their work that will be displayed in the classroom.

Learning about Healthy Habits Vs Unhealthy Habits:


